| | home environment. Patient's conditions typically include MND, |
| | Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis, Huntingtons disease, traumatic |

| | The team includes physiotherapists, OTs , Psychologists, rehab assistants |
| | and a traumatic brain injury nurse specialist. Morale and job satisfaction |
| | was clearly high. The team place an emphasis on treating patients in a |
| | holistic way which can involve them in issues such as benefits, |
| | safeguarding and end of life care. Parking is a real issue for both the team |
| | and patients. The latter often refuse appointments at the hospital in favour of waiting longer for a home or community visit. This is because their |
| | conditions make the struggle to find a parking space very stressful. Staff |
| | have been allocated four spaces but can often find these occupied if they |
| | leave during the day for a home visit. The team reported feeling a bit |
| | forgotten in terms of the wider Trust. In addition bids for educational |
| | funding submitted six months ago have not had a response. No senior |
| | leaders have been seen by the team for a considerable time. The team |
| | would like the opportunity to work with neurology services to develop |
| | specialist multi -disciplinary clinics and improve patient pathways and |
| | care. They have been informed that a recent business case for an |
| | additional neurologist has been rejected leaving just 2.5 in post. |
